Town Hall Meeting Recap

Principal Newman hosted a Town Hall for BTHS families on Wednesday,

---BrooklynTechPTA----August 5th at 6:30 PM to discuss questions about school reopening plans 000000000

in progress. Over 500 families attended the Town Hall remotely, either online or by dialing into the meeting teleconference line.


During the Town Hall meeting, Mr. Newman introduced the hybrid remote learning / in-person instructional program Brooklyn Tech is preparing to roll out when school reconvenes in September. Under this plan, the entire student body will be divided into four cohorts. Each cohort will have an even mix of students from all four grade levels. The four cohorts will take turns attending classes in physical classrooms at the school building in a four-day cycle, so each student will generally physically attend classes in classrooms at the school building once every four days, or approximately 5 days per month. On other school days, each student will attend classes remotely from home. Students may also opt to attend school in a 100% remote format, without any physical attendance at the school building whatsoever.

Regardless of which instructional format students participate in, every student will follow a pre-planned, set schedule and will participate in live, interactive lessons every day, either remotely or, on up to 5 days per month, in a physical classroom. Mr. Newman highlighted that all Major classes, AP classes and other special classes unique to Brooklyn Tech will continue to be offered under this plan, and no classes would be cancelled, despite the remote mode of instruction, because Brooklyn Tech is unique for it's extensive offering of specialized courses and this is an important consideration for many families and students choosing to attend to Tech. Supporting all of these course offerings, even in the new blended remote/on site instructional format, is key to the Tech educational experience.

Mr. Newman also pointed out that the planned hybrid instructional format will work seamlessly even if the school needs to close for a quarantine period at any time during the school year due to an outbreak of COVID cases in or around the school. However, Mr. Newman also mentioned that the plan is still subject to approval from the DOE, so it is still a work in progress.

During the Town Hall, Mr. Newman responded to nearly 60 specific questions that the PA had gathered in advance from Brooklyn Tech families at large. 

1) BTHS Library Summer Passion Project

With the lack of summer jobs, internships, and other opportunities in 2020, students are looking for ways to learn and expand their experiences while at home. An independent passion project (aka 20% time project) is a great way to take advantage of this time to delve into personal interests and it also shows student initiative. Passion Projects that involve research and learning can be shared with teachers who write recommendation letters, be incorporated into college essays, and included on college applications.

The Summer Passion Project program involves a student (or a group of students) developing their own project and learning about something they are passionate about, but also sharing the learning in a way that could be useful or potentially useful, and reflecting on their experience.

Students in the program are following their own desires to learn and reach out, mixing and matching among their diverse interests. The projects include time spent learning through books, research articles, interviews, testing, etc. Students in the program are writing and sharing songs, blogs, websites, stories and a novel, poems, computer code, interviewing alumni, teaching classes and mentoring projects for younger students, doing a Ted Talk, making and editing videos, making masks, and starting a baking business. Some will be learning and teaching about the Chinese Exclusion Act, food science, fogponics, gentrification, current politics, the crisis in Yemen, comparing Covid in different countries, discrimination in health care, climate change, how to reduce plastic in businesses, sharing college advice, staying organized with schoolwork, how not to raise a serial killer, photography, how to make miso and more!

While the deadline has passed to sign up, students can do their own passion projects and submit them for sharing; there is still almost a month before projects are due.


